RECLAIMED BAYOU: POTS FOR PLOTS Where single-use plastic pots end up remains largely under-reported. Those of us in the green industry go through hundreds if not thousands of them each season. We rely on people in the nursery or recycling industries to process them appropriately. Others stockpile them in yards or storage containers waiting for the opportunity to recycle them. Whether it is on a large or small scale, plastic pots have become an industry-wide problem, with up to 98 percent of them ending up in landfills.

WHY FOCUS ON MATERIALS MANAGEMENT

The goal of the program is to provide better materials management and waste diversion at the grassroots and community level. This will create programs to remove materials from the waste stream via reuse, efficient recycling, upcycling, and other management options. Bayou Preservation sees community and local involvement in a circular economy as a mechanism to keep these items out of the greater Lower Galveston Bay watershed.

PHASES	HOW	WHY
Spring 2023: Trial Run	Target local plant nurseries to reach Houston community	 Only 1% of Plastic planting pots are recycled, annually. Plastic plant pots cannot be recycled through municipal systems.
Summer 2023: Wholesaler Outreach	Target wholesale nurseries as receiving partners	 Wholesalers are a large consumers of new plastic pots. Reuse of pots by businesses we can decrease plastic waste by stopping the need for new plastic.
Fall 2023: New site partner outreach	Target newer collection site partners for greater program spread	Setting up more collection sites outside of plant nurseries creates a great chance to reach the community about the importance of plastic materials management.
